Academy9 Innovation Papers Competition

The aim of the **Academy9 Innovation Papers Competition** is to raise awareness of and inspire innovation across the field of STEM, and to celebrate the Year of Young People.

Competition winners will be invited to submit a full paper, and will be asked to take part in a video presentation for inclusion and display at the Academy9 Conference. It is intended that these presentations will particularly inspire young people who will be attending the conference, highlighting to them the creativity experienced while working in STEM careers.

There are four categories under which entries can be made:

1. Working with Communities and Young People.
2. Safety and Wellbeing.
3. Sustainability.
4. Technical Innovation.

Single ideas can be submitted under multiple qualifying categories.

How to enter

Initially, a synopsis of no more than 500 words should be submitted, which defines the scope of your project and the innovation achieved through it. This could be a design solution, a new discovery or a new way of solving a situation or issue.

The initial maximum 500-word synopsis should cover the following:

- Scope and innovation.
- Start and end date.
- Number of days you have spent on the project.
- Outcomes, benefits and impact.
